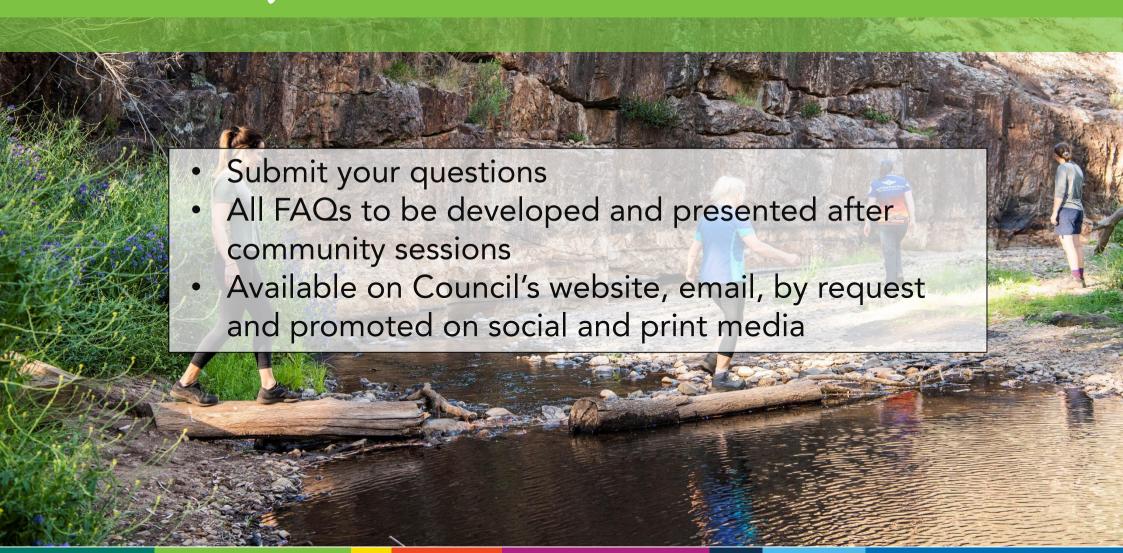

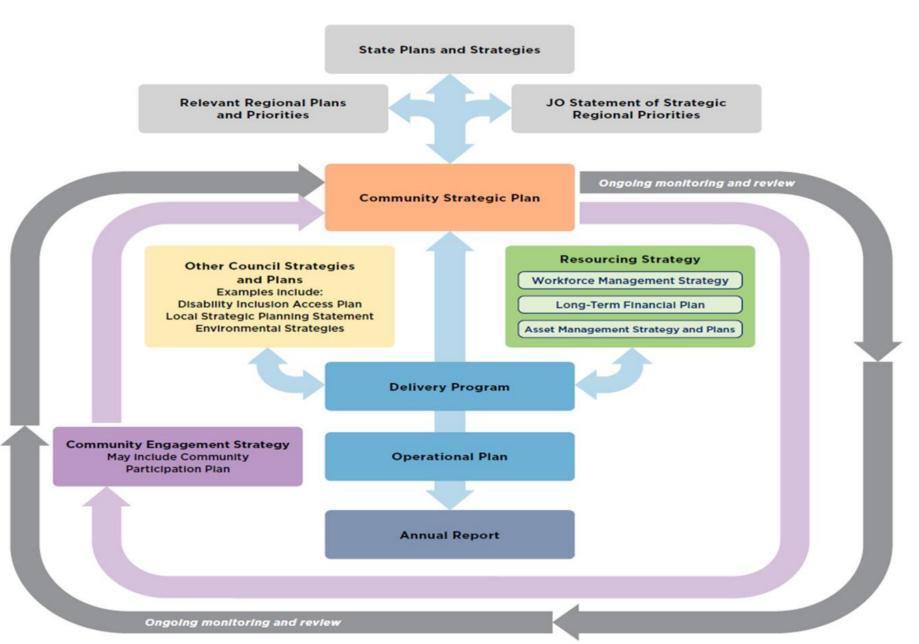

Who responded?

314 total respondents. 39% are from in the Gilgandra Area, while Armatree, Ballandoran, Biddon, Breelong, Collie, Curban, Tooraweenah and Warrumbungle areas were all represented.

82% would be likely or very likely to recommend Gilgandra Shire as a place to live.

81% would be likely or very likely to recommend Gilgandra Shire as a place to Visit.

54% would be likely or very likely to recommend Gilgandra Shire as a place to start/grow a business.

Rural Roads were the main reason for contacting Council. 26% felt Council dealt with their concern Poorly.

- · Majority of respondents want to hear Council **news** through the **Gil Weekly**, followed by social media and website.
- Local Medical Centre/Dentists, Rural Roads and Bridges, Town Water Supply, Sewerage Service, Public Toilets, Aged
 Care Facilities, Disability Services and Waste Collection and Service were considered the most important
 facilities.
- What Council does **Well**: Public toilets, Playgrounds and sports ground, Disability services, Parks & gardens, Library, Waste collection, Town water, Sewerage, Medical Centres, Community Events.
- What Council does Poor: rural roads and bridges, Development applications.
- 64% scored Council's Overall Performance 5 and above.

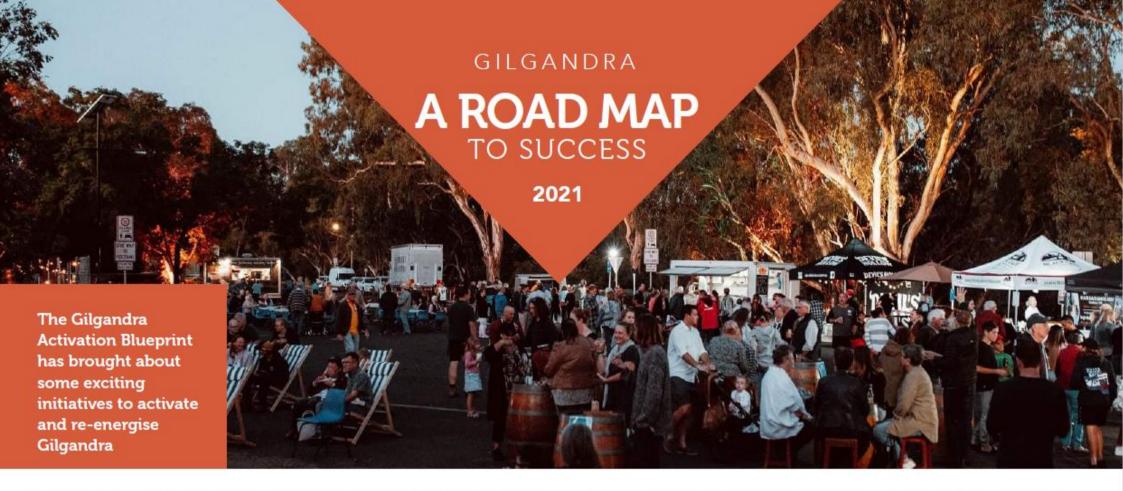

Inland Pail...

GrainCorp Industrial Precinct

- \$3.9 Million Grant from NSW State Government
- \$700,000 from Council
- Additional \$800,000 provision for Biodiversity cost
- Project is delayed by 2 to 3 years as a result of financial implications of the NSW Biodiversity Offset Scheme
- Original estimate \$2.1 Million, now after 2 years and a reduction in project scope the cost is around \$550,000 plus \$100,000 in consultant cost. Funded from the grant
- Finalising purchase with GrainCorp for 15HA of land
- Creating of a 4 lot sub division to facilitate the sale
- Near finalised subdivision plan allows for a mix of 0.5ha to 1ha lots with the ability to amalgamate. No lots smaller than 5000m2 have been planned
- Design and development application is currently being developed with the aim to have a sale finalised

Transformation Project #4

CASTLEREAGH River Beautification

Gilgandra Shire Council has commenced planning an ambitious project to beautify and restore the Castlereagh River from Bridge Street through to the Gilgandra Cultural Precinct.

The project involves removing accumulated sand and sediment from within the river to create a nicturesque. semi-permanent water body which would enable waterbased recreational activities and passive use for visitors and locals. The project is set to inject new life into Gilgandra by improving water security for the town, reducing flood risk and connecting the Golf Course and Racecourse to existing walking tracks, whilst activating riverside commercial opportunities within the CBD.

The project would also provide a valuable concernity to capitalise on the Inland Rail project and the anticipated

demand for sand resources for concrete construction particularly for the Namonine to Narrahri section

Preliminary investigations have been undertaken to determine quality and quantity of the sand available to be removed, the type of weir required, estimated costings, planning process involved and job creation prospects as a result of the project.

Council is in the early stages of understanding and commencing the approval process, which will involve detailed investigations, studies, licenses and permits necessary to progress and implement the project. Extensive consultation with the many stakeholders involved and detailed community engagement will also form a critical part of this project.



To enhance the ecological health of the Castlemanh River through creation of a semi-permanent water body, supporting water security and economic development potential for Gilgandra Region whilst improving recreational amenity for local and visitors

Project elements

The project seeks to metom the formation of a semi-nermanent waterbody in the Castlereach River which in turn will create a public recreational space, emergency water supply and improve the quality of the local environment. The key components of the project are:

- · Waterway and foreshore restoration
- · Reservoir/velocity control structure and fish
- Waterfront beautification
- Sand processing facility







The river project will be discussed in the Activation presentation in more detail Or vice versa

Where it fits with inland rail is one of the most significant opportunities is precasting of concrete for all the structures.

- 16km Bridges
- 640 Culvert Banks

We have all the natural resources if we are able to extract the sand. The transport savings alone will make it hugely attractive to establish precasting in Gilgandra

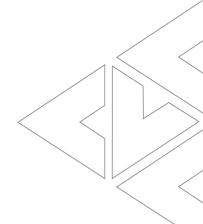
Scope

TWAF

- Gilgandra one of 3 or 4 camp sites for N2N
- Up to 500 person facility
- Operational for approximately 5 years
- Occupancy would vary during the construction
- Not all workers on the project would be in the TWAF with other accommodation utilise by some contractors.

Staff Housing

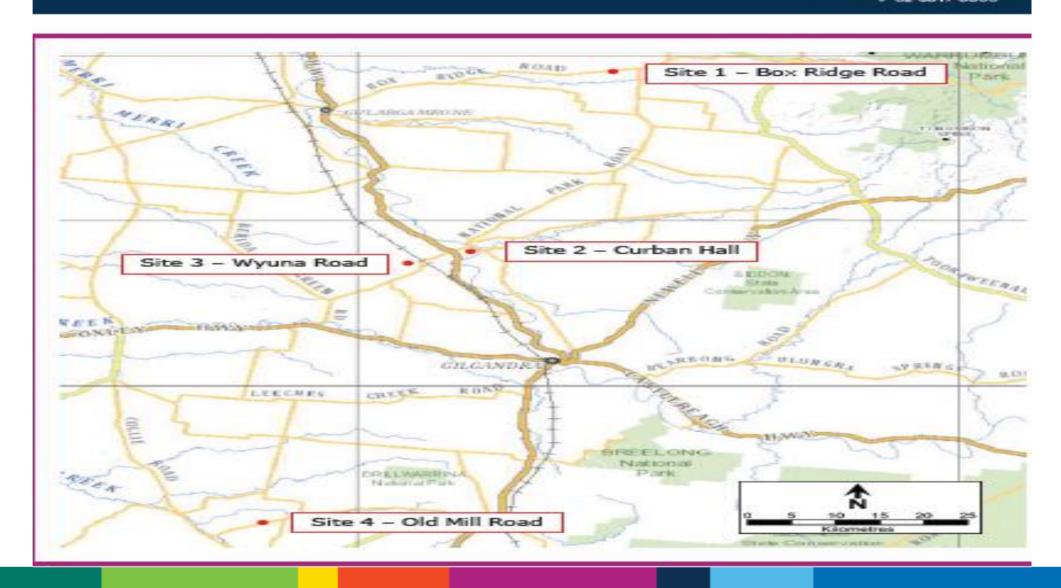
- ARTC and contractors have given a verbal commitment that a range of permeant accommodation is required during to the duration of the project
- At this point it is estimated between 10 and 20 houses could be required
- Add to this there is already an accommodation shortage, the housing strategy identifies a shortage of worker housing

THE GIL LIBRARY HUB Gilgandra is making the Library a must-visit Destination

The new GIL Library Hub will deliver on Council's core action to drive The Gilgandra Activation Blueprint. This commitment is about delivering community assets, enhancing and complementing existing services to further drive community and visitors to the CBD with a vibrant, attractive and socially connected space.

Gilgandra Shire Library commenced operations in 1923 as a part library, part community gathering space, and the building has adapted internally to changing community needs. However, the space that was once ample became increasingly cramped as the Library has attempted to provide the increasing service need in our community.

The GIL Library Hub project is made possible with the assistance of a range of funding contributors, including the Building Better Regions Fund (Rd 4), Gilgandra Shire Council, and NSW state government funding through Create NSW and State Library Fund. Construction is expected to commence at 30-32 Miller Street early 2022 with completion expected in mid 2022.



The GIL Library Hub will be a dynamic community living room, creating a strong, modern centerpiece in the heart of Gilgandra that attracts passers-by and celebrates our local identity.

New Hunter Park Sports Recreational Precinct Concept

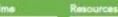
The Concept Plans for the New Hunter Park Sporting Precinct have now been finalised. The plans have been endorsed by the Gilgandra Shire Sports Council and include:

- 50m swimming pool, all abilities access, separate learn to swim and water splash pool
- Shaded viewing areas, generous grassed seating areas
- Amenities
- Multipurpose Club House
- Two full size multipurpose basketball courts and spectator area
- A modern indoor gymnasium and fitness spaces
- A youth centre including a "chill out" youth space
- · Office and administration areas
- Provide a central access and egress point and shared klosk and canteen area facilities
- Four new tennis courts
- Extensive On-site parking
- External lighting and CCTV

Vision

To create a Multipurpose Indoor Sports Centre which provides for a modern youth centre, gymnasium and outdoor public swimming pool which supports the growth and development of sports and recreation in Gilgandra.

No budget allocation has been made to the construction stage of the new Precinct at this time, however, these plans will be used in pursuit of funding opportunities from other levels of Government.

Infrastructure assets...





Our current water infrastructure is aging and establishing water security for the township and surrounding villages is considered by Council to be essential for the longevity of the community.

Gilgandra has two projects currently under consideration:

- Construction and augmentation of reticulation system and Gilgandra Water Treatment Plant (Business Case); and
- Construction of a new Sewage Treatment Plant, pumping stations, sewer mains and associated works (Business Case).
