He organised a Bourke leg for the 'Ride for Life', which raised funds for the accommodation block at Dubbo

Base Hospital for Cancer patients and their families. He also played the part of the mounted horseman in the re-enactment of the Kookaburra Recruiting March when they left Tooraweenah.

Sonnie also unveiled the statue of the 'Returned Digger' at the G.K. Rohr viewing platform.

Being a returned serviceman of WWII, Sonnie has always been an active participant of the Tooraweenah Anzac Day activities.

Sonnie has continually been keen to lend a hand when local charities need help with their fund raising.

If anyone saw the Hollywood movie Marley and me, it was about a headstrong Labrador pup that grew into a lovable but over the top, uncontrollable mature dog. While growing up, it basically caused havoc for the family, destroying household furniture and pulling them from pillar to post when ever they tried to do anything with it. While it made for a hilarious movie, in real life one

behaviour from their pet. In the case of Marley, a lot of their problems could have been avoided if they had taken more notice of the temperament of him as a pup, as he would have been highly excitable at a young age.

But even energetic and strong willed dogs can be calmed with the age old remedy of patience, pressure on and off as needed and repetition of controlling drills and constant praise of any successes. A strong dog that wants to pull away in front of you needs to have pressure applied to make it uncomfortable to want to pull you, hence a short leash, once it realises that it is much more comfortable to just walk with you, the leash can be extended and body language

would not put up with that sought of relaxed. To get it to stop, just pull-up as you are walking with pressure to the leash, a slight tug if needed and the command stop! Then praise and patting when you get a success. Once again, repetition will eventually get the penny to drop that it is uncomfortable to resist and rewarding to please the boss. Getting the dog to sit is basically the same, walking along get the dog to stop (praise, pat, good dog) then pressure back and down with the command SIT till the dog sits because of discomfort then relax body language and praise. Once again, patience and repetition will inevitably get you the success.

The Natural Disaster Restoration works from the 2020 flood event will ramp up in April, with 4 restoration packages now awarded to four private contractors.

Council works crews are also continuing restoration works in the south-western section of the Shire.

In total there will be 7 roads crews working throughout the Shire during April and May. Council has also advertised a further 3 packages for tender which include most roads in the north-western to the north-eastern part of the Shire with these works to commence from the middle of the year. We have learnt and practiced our Fire Safety messages, including "Ready, Set, Go, 000", and knowing what to do if our clothes are on fire: Stop, Drop and Roll; and if the room is full of smoke, we know to 'Get down low and go, go, go!'. The children all made sure they did their 'homework' and taught their family members these safety messages too. We talked about Police, Fire and Ambulance and were very excited to have Constable Iain Hayes from Tooraweenah Police visit us at preschool on Wednesday and Thursday.



Everyone was excited to meet lain and listened carefully as he talked to staying safe and road safety. We also had some great questions to ask him. We thank Ian for taking the time to

come and see us, especially when he was off duty, to meet and chat with us. We will return his visit next term when



we go down and see lain at the Tooraweenah Police Station. We can't wait!

The children have enjoyed lots of building, designing and working together as a team at the mobilo and also the train set. We've had builders in the sandpit and tool table outside and at the hammering set inside. Lots of fun and dramatic play in and around our new inside tent, as well as some lovely story time together, and fun with the dress-ups and creating interesting characters in our role play.

Our new resources have arrived and it's been fun exploring and investigating new craft items, including screen prints, templates and rollers, and also experimenting with other interesting items, including time turners, 'Magnetic Attraction', new construction sets, small cars and traffic signs and a box of extra train track pieces to help us

build an even bigger and more complex train track. We've also received new buckets, boats, and a new 'aqua play' set for outside too, and a new hat rack and notes pockets banner. We will purchase our other new resources as listed from our successful grant in late 2020. In the near future we hope to get some new lockers for children's bags too.


