Hints From The Dog House! With Brendan Butler

In the last couple of Bungles' doghouse tips we've looked at getting control of a young dog on a leash with some drills to get them to walk calmly, at heel, to stop on command and sit.

We've done this by using pressure on the leash or a tug to get their attention, and pressure off and instant praise as soon as we get a positive result, then repetition to instill the positives. It is quite rewarding for us to be able to go for a walk with our pooches not having to be wrestling with them for control and equally so to have our working dogs under control, calm and not barking their heads off.

Another handy tool for a house or working dog is to take the 'sit' command to the next level and get them to 'stay'. Still using our leash we get the pup to stop, sit, then we want to move in front of the pup preferably with it calm and relaxed and give the command 'stay' but with us bent over it ready to put down and back pressure if it wants to move up and forward, which it will. As soon as the down pressure gets a response the

pressure comes off, praise. Repeat this procedure until we're getting a few seconds of calm and that turns into many seconds.

It is important to praise the dog when it relaxes but we're not giving it a signal to move yet. We don't want the pup to take the affection as a sign that it is time to go until we decide. Once the pup realises that if it stays put and calm it won't get a checking tug down and will get a pat and a 'good dog', we can move our body up and away, but our body language needs to be over the pup to signal that we are in charge and we will repeat again. If we get some success we praise the dog, stand back for a few seconds then call the dog. This indicates that the staying is over. Go for a short walk then repeat again. Once we are getting the pup to stay when we move up and away a few feet we can keep increasing the distance we move including to the side and eventually metres away and increase time away.

Eventually it will become just another command to the dog where it

sits and waits until told to come. The keys are 'pressure on' until success, instant 'pressure off' and praise with any success and repetition. Your dog will happily sit where you want it while you are calmly putting your ewes and lambs through a narrow gate or ducking into Lester's to grab the mail.



Councillor's Corner with Cr Brian Mockler



It's pleasing to see graders out and about in some areas undertaking some muchneeded road rehabilitation works.

Gilgandra Shire is one of twelve regional councils to receive a share (\$598,198) of the State Government High Streets

Revitalisation Program to boost local business, support jobs, create better public spaces and transform streetscapes.

Recently councillors and management attended a briefing by the NSW Parliament Committee Inquiry into the Inland Rail

Project and Regional NSW. Council made a comprehensive submission on economic opportunities, infrastructure and community engagement factors relevant to the shire.

At the monthly meeting on April 21, council adopted rating and service charges models for its 2021/2022 budget. Rural Waste charges remain at \$22 per assessment. That represents the proportionate rehabilitation cost for closed rural waste facilities and a notional charge/contribution towards utilisation of the Gilgandra Waste facility.

Development applications approved in March totalled \$1,286,876. Berakee Quarry extension DA is awaiting Regional Planning Panel determination.


