19th March – Huskers Trophy


Noel Cornish, who is our newest member, took out the trophy with a winning score of 61. Welcome to the Tooraweenah Golf Club Noel.



Hints From The Dog House! With Brendan Butler



Most livestock farms around our district have at least a work dog or two and there is an estimated 270,000 work dogs across Australia, so the humble kelpie, collie and koolies play an under estimated part in the management of our livestock industries. For the last 200 years dog breeders have been building on these work dogs natural instincts to herd and move our stock and please there boss by selecting for the traits that suit different stock types, farms, situations and climates.

Each farm has a different way of managing and each area can have a different

topography so our work dogs have to suit our individual management style and

On our farm Oakfield, the preference is for a sturdy, smart all-round dog that can help muster, drove and then work under pressure in the yards, often all in the one day, which is a tall order to find, but they

Further west the dogs would have to be lighter and more athletic because of the bigger paddocks and warmer climate, the longer droves requires dogs to have more natural distance off their stock so as not to pressure them to much and some noted breeders out there have achieved this trait

Other breeders have got yard and truck work dogs down to a fine art with dogs that can work tirelessly for hours backing, barking and applying pressure to stock to keep them moving at close quarters. Councillors Corner - Cr Mockler Reports



An outline of Councillors activities throughout March: Full day workshops and briefing presentations on the

1st March, 8 March, and 15 March, which included Economic Development, Inland Rail project, Gilgandra Lifestyles Operations, Cooee Lodge, Cooee Villas, Jack Towney Hostel, Community Care, Transport, Meals on Wheels, Orana Living, Carlginda, Homelessness, Housing and Local Roads planning. Business systems review, Councillor Local Government NSW training seminar, Aged Care independent report, Budget preparations followed by local roads inspection and community consultation.

After all of that, Councils monthly meeting on the 15 of March .
Council has held extensive community consultation throughout March at Tooraweenah, Armatree , Cobboco and in Gilgandra. The results and feedback are central to Councillors and Management preparing, finalising and prioritising the whole of community planning strategy over the current term

of Council and also Council's long term 10 year financial plan.

It needs to be remembered these are NOT day to day operational matters, but strategic planning matters to reflect the vision that Council strives to achieve, and objectives and priorities which are then reported against Councils Operational Plan and Delivery Program. The latter reflected in its capital works program.

This has facilitated an opportunity to contribute constructively with what the community wants to be prioritised and achieved in Councils overarching community driven strategic plan. Councillors responsibilities are then to represent, advocate and promote those matters in finalising and adopting the Community Strategic Plan (CSP). Interestingly, some community members have difficulty in distinguishing what is OPERATIONAL and what is involved in STRATEGIC PLANNING. Road surface conditions for example, pot holes etc are operational and need to be reported by way of a report or complaint, via the online

reporting system or by calling Council to make a report. Another example is an issue with mail delivery to a rural property address, this is not relevant to Council, but is an Australia Post matter. Council is not a complaint bucket for every issue. That needs to be recognised. Community participation at Tooraweenah on the 16th of March was welcome and constructive, some really good ideas and planning concepts to be

included in the strategic operational and capital works program.

Next years budget planning is underway.

IPART determined a 0.7% rate increase.

That is unsustainable given what Council is required to provide with its core

Councillors are also considering budgetary constraints as to what services and capital works projects are achievable, taking into account grant funding opportunities and Councils capacity to deliver within its Councils resources capacity.

Tooraweenah Preschool Developing 'Wings of Independence' With Miss Marie

We have welcomed new preschool friends and their families to our preschool community: it sure is exciting turning 3!

We have all enjoyed welcoming and playing with these new friends, enjoying lots of happy, friendly and smiling faces at preschool every day to play, learn and explore with.

their toys, books, and even their preschool! We have drawn happy faces on wooden pegs, then painted them carefully using bright colours. The children have chosen some felt material to 'dress' them in and given them hair. The idea is to give these children a little toy/peg friend that they can hold in their hand or keep in their pocket or bag, hopefully giving them a smile and sharing our love and support.

Outside we have had fun with obstacle courses; allowing friends to challenge their gross motor and body co-ordination skills with different equipment and tasks. We completed a large obstacle course on the oval which was fabulous, as well as a smaller obstacle course at preschool.



Children quickly adapted this course into a game they named 'The Lava Game'. They had to manage lots of movements, including balance, climb, stretch, jump, leap, crawl through a tunnel and run to get to the other end of this, along with lots of smiles and laughter too. Preschool friends have loved investigating a range of different play spaces and experiences: including our very own 'Subway' Sandwich Shop (with real 'Subway' uniforms and things); with several budding chefs now on our radar for future restaurant reservations. We have also had doctors and nurses tending to and fixing up both people and toys; and our builders have been exploring and experimenting with several different constructions, including straws, wooden blocks, Lego and Mobilo, when they have been building tall towers and cities, as well as large sheds and stables for the horses. More farming fun in the sandpit as well as lots of exploration and fun art/ craft experiences.



Our amazing fortnightly visitor, or FIFO (Fly in, fly out) scientist, Edna Einstein, has been showing us fun science experiments about 'Density'. The children have loved these visits. We have made our own colourful cylinders with different liquids and experimented with floating and sinking, using fresh and salty water and some eggs.

Outside we have planted lots of flower seeds in one of our garden beds, whilst enjoying the last of the cherry tomatoes from another.

Recently we've had the shade cloth frame raised to a much safer height, allowing us to all enjoy this space and continue to explore, learn, play and work together safely. Plans for further beautification of this area are well

underway. Children are constantly checking to see if our seeds and flowers have sprouted and also wondering what colour the different flowers will be when they do.

Children have been busy keeping tabs on our 'adopted' preschool pet frog, who appears anywhere and everywhere each day. So far we have found him in the sandpit, in the shed, in the watering can and even on the fixed climbing equipment. He must like preschool as much as we do!

We recently held our AGM and have a new Management Committee elected for 2022. We thank both the outgoing 2021 Committee and the incoming 2022 Committee for their commitment and dedication to our preschool. Please know that your work and efforts are all greatly appreciated and valued. Thank you.

Success (Students, Through Evidencebased Practices, to Success)

Parents of students in K/1 may have noticed a change in the types of books they are learning to read with in the classroom.

Research has shown that teaching phonics (sound letter correspondence) to young students while also allowing them to practice the skills of reading using these known sounds, allows students greater success in their long term reading journey.



That's where decodable readers come in. Our students practice their reading using decodable readers in class and during home

We continue to read and discuss a broad range of quality picture books and literature to our students and encourage parents to do this at home too. Being exposed to a broad range of language through books promotes a wider vocabulary, language skills and love of books. Are you interested in helping your child read more fluently? Did you know that singing and reciting poetry as well as re-reading books can improve rhythm and phrasing and help promote natural expression and reading

Flood Packs




