We have had so much fun investigating, week. discovering, experimenting, and exploring together.

We have been fortunate to be able to enjoy our outdoor environment as much as we have, and we have loved having Miss Shannon's chickens, of all sizes and colours, visit us, including some of 'our' chickens that we hatched in the incubator earlier in the year. "Jasper" is a sure favourite, and some new little friends had a great time getting cuddles from friends and playing in the sandpit!

Each week we enjoy our Bush Preschool programme with a parent helper, checking out the natural world and our environment to see if there have been any changes in the paddock, at the mountains and down at the creek.

We check the progress of the baby Galahs in the big tree, keeping an eye out for them sitting next to each other and watching us. We see the native bees buzzing around their hive in the tree and check out what the ants are doing at two giant ant nests as we make our way down to the creek. We found several yabby claws along the edge of the creek, some tiny 'fish' (or water bugs?) swimming in the water and watched some large water birds feeding a little further down. Friends have enjoyed 'fishing' with some long reeds and making boats with

A good worker in any business is obviously invaluable and it makes sense that we would make sure that they are properly trained to undertake the work that is required in that business. While a work dog can't be compared to a human employee, it is often said that a clever and well trained dog can be worth multiple workers when it comes to doing stock work on a farm.

A Dogs ability to quickly get around a mob of sheep, cattle or even wild goats is probably better than a person on a quad bike because of their ability to get into tight spots that we just aren't able to get to, and their speed and agility in Tooraweenah was fortunate to

So, if we are inclined to want to use our four legged mates as workers then it makes sense to go to the trouble of training them properly so for started dogs, over 2 days in mid that the work can be done efficiently and without drama. Most stockmen who use dogs have some method of getting their work dogs trained to a certain standard, but there are also a lot of dogs that

have good ability but are poorly trained.

Students have learned many skills in coding, following step-by-step instructions and visual literacy skills using these Lego Kits. We look forward to borrowing the kit again in the future. The next kit we borrow will arrive early in Term 3 and is a NEW kit called Aeroponics.

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
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
