The beginner school will be run on Tuesday the 15th by





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Tooraweenah Preschool, 'Developing Wings of Independence' With Marie Gale (Jacobsen)

Our term has certainly whizzed by, we have been busy enjoying preschool and barely noticed! We will enjoy celebrating Easter before the holidays and practicing our song "Lest We Forget (One More Parade)" with our big school friends and our amazing singing Mum.

We have spent a lot of time over the past few weeks investigating creatures in our world, which stemmed from the discovery of two butterflies and some other insects in our playground. This led to a long discussion about the many different creatures that we know about, how they work together and live together, sometimes they work like a team like our preschool friends do, other times they 'play on their own' – again, just like us.

We have enjoyed talking about many different creatures, big and small, and discovering where they live, how they keep safe, and importantly, what they like to eat! While on this learning journey, we have also enjoyed many of Eric Carle's stories, especially 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and 'The Bad-Tempered Ladybird".

This led to further inquiry around co-operation, companionship, kindness, and community. The children have linked this with how we work together at preschool and with our big school friends at Tooraweenah Public School, even to our combined singing presentation that we are practicing for the Tooraweenah community ANZAC Day service.

We have read some interesting 'lift the flap' books about animal homes and insects – we have enjoyed guessing the 'answers' before revealing the pictures underneath and had a great time singing some new songs and learning some new dances and games. We love playing 'Farmer in the Dell', singing the Pirate Song and dancing "The Kangaroo Rock" as well as the 'Freeze' dance. Recently, we had fun singing and marching to 'The Ants Go Marching One by One" and playing our musical instruments to accompany us.

We have had some interesting 'small world' activities on offer: we've had a 'pond world' with various pond animal puppets to play with, followed by an

'insect world' with large insect counters in trays of Huon pine wood shavings (from Tasmania) to play with. Our floral tree has been a focal point for each 'world' with it being the home for birds and a bird nest and also butterflies of all sizes.

Friends have also investigated marbles, magnets and movement, with various activities and experiments, both openended and structured. Children have discovered amazing things about speed and movement (with the different marble runs) as well as positive and negative forces and 'sticking' or 'not sticking' with the magnets – even measuring how far the magnets in the car can make it move with the magnet wand!

Another new activity that has been fun to play has been the 'buried treasure' games. The first game had a tray with white 'snow' hiding some colours transport figurines that could only be taken out with coloured tongs; they were matching coloured tongs, counters and bowls to sort into for this game. The second buried treasure game was the tray with snow and coloured pom-poms that could only be picked up with the tea-leaf strainers – commonly called a 'claw' by some friends!

We welcomed new friend Ted and last week we enjoyed playing basketball and soccer together with lots of different balls for everyone to play with together. They even fitted in our wheelbarrows for a ride! We've practiced our Emergency Drills, for both a Bush Fire Emergency and a Lock Down situation and worked together as a team to make sure everyone was safe and knows what to do in those situations. After these drills we learnt our safety messages of 'Ready, Set, Go, 000'; also 'Get down low and go, go, go' if the room is full of smoke and 'Stop, Drop and Roll' if our clothes are on fire.

Preschool recently held our AGM and thank the 2024 Management
Committee for all of their amazing work and we welcome the 2025 Management
Committee with several new parents joining the team. Thank you everyone.
We officially accepted the updated
Tooraweenah Preschool Constitution at this meeting, which has been approved

by the NSW Fair Trading Commission.

We are excited about receiving four new trikes, purchased using money raised at the February Community BBQs. A big thank you to everyone who donated food and time, to the community for supporting us, and to Ash Jenkin and team at the Mountain View for the opportunity to fundraise this way. Our preschool friends love riding our bikes around the bike track so these new trikes will be a welcome addition to the two large bikes and balance bikes we already have.

Our preschool clock is 'going round and round very fast' making our days come and go before we know it, so it will be the end of term in no time! The last day of Term 1 is Friday 11th April, with both Easter and ANZAC Day falling in the school holidays, and children returning for Term 2 on Wednesday 30th April.

We wish everyone a very "Happy Easter" and look forward to seeing as many of our friends as possible when we perform with big school friends at the ANZAC Day service just before we return for Term 2.

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
