

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR Mayor and Councillors






















It is with pleasure that I present my Mayoral Message which forms part of the Gilgandra Shire Council (Council) State of Our Region Report 2021/24. This report highlights the achievement of the Council over this term of Council, which concludes on the 14 September 2024. I am proud of the achievements that our Council has made during the past three years and the strategic vision which will enable the ongoing success for the incoming Council.

The weather this year has been somewhat more conducive to road repairs which was welcomed to enable Council to significantly progress restoration works associated with the seven Natural Disaster Declarations that we were required to address since 2020. The restoration works have given an overall improved standard of travel across our rural road network.

Council's exposure to Aged Care and Disability Services has resulted in our requirement to come to terms with the varying Royal Commissions within Aged Care and Disability Services. One requirement that has a physical impact on our community was the recruitment of qualified Filipino staff, which enables us to meet a minimum care requirement of 200 minutes a day of which 30 are delivered by a Registered Nurse. Other requirements, as they impact upon several of the Aged Care Quality Standards, were also brought under a spotlight regarding service delivery. It is interesting to note that whilst some councils have a responsibility for the delivery of Aged Care services, others have the responsibility of the delivery of disability services or National Disability Insurance Scheme. As I understand it, Gilgandra is the only council that delivers both together with the Indigenous Specific Aged Care as it related to the Jack Towney Hostel.

The decision by the Federal Government to reset the works schedule on the Narromine to Brisbane section of Inland Rail has reduced the momentum that had been generated. However, work to secure land associated with the rail corridor does continue, as does Council's strategic planning to optimise the opportunities that Inland Rail, and for that matter, Renewable Energy projects have for our community. That said, Council's staff worked hard to progress an ambitious Capital Works Program. Whilst not fully completed, I commend the staff and contractors for their efforts.

As I complete my fourteenth year as Mayor, it would be remiss of me not to offer my thanks to our General Manager, Mr David Neeves, who after eight years in the role is well respected by his staff and other councils and continues to provide effective leadership.

I offer my sincere thanks to the Elected Members for their hard work and the fact that without their commitment and productivity, Gilgandra Shire Council would not retain their reputation for providing a community that is a wonderful place in which to lw > Enjoy > 6 lw >.

INTRODUCTION

The Local Government Act 1993 and the Integrated Planning and Reporting (IP&R) Framework requires Council to prepare a State of our City (formerly known as the End of Term) Report. Acknowledging the Gilgandra Region is not classified as a City and such term is misleading, this report has been re-titled "State of our Region". The report outlines Council's progress on implementing the Gilgandra Region Community Strategic Plan (CSP) over the previous four years. The Report outlines the achievements of Council, identifies challenges and aids in the review of the CSP.

Gilgandra Shire Council (Council) adopted the CSP on 28 June 2022 following a community survey in 2021 and community consultation in March 2022. The plan represents an opportunity to create and foster community based goals and aspirations to drive a sustainable community that reconciles itself with current and future challenges.

The CSP is organised into the following decision-making strategies:

Live, Enjoy, Grow & Lead.

The basis for the CSP decision making principles were considered in conjunction with State and Regional Plans, relevant Council plans and strategies, priorities, challenges, and opportunities identified by Council with feedback from the community via multiple consultation opportunities.

While Council has a custodial role in initiating, preparing, and maintaining the CSP on behalf of the community, it is not wholly responsible for its implementation. The plan acknowledges that some initiatives and actions cannot be delivered solely by Council and identifies where it may have an advocacy role on behalf of the community.



COMMUNITY **SURVEY**

In 2021, Gilgandra Shire residents were asked to share their views on Council's future direction, with a community survey taking place across the region. The survey was designed to provide important insight into the local community's priorities and satisfaction levels when it comes to Council activities, its service delivery, available facilities, and future planning. A total of 314 residents participated in the survey.

Key Findings

- Most used facilities and services included town water supply, rural roads and bridges, sewerage services, town streets and footpaths, waste collection and services, Gilgandra Fitness Centre and the Library.
- Most important facilities and services included local medical centre/dentists, rural roads and bridges, town water supply, sewerage service, public toilets, aged care facilities, disability services and waste collection and service.



INFRASTRUCTURE

NATURAL DISASTERS

Council was still recovering from natural disaster events at the time of the Local Government elections in December 2021 when more were encountered. One occurred immediately before the term in November 2021, with a further two experienced in August and September of 2022. During the period between January 2022 and June 2024, Council carried out flood damage works totaling \$3.39M.









GRAVEL RE-SHEETING

Gravel re-sheeting completed during this term of Council included:

- 6km Gular Rail Road
- 17km Hillside Road
- 6km Balladoran Railway Road
- 22km Milpulling Road

Re-sheeting has been completed using funding from the Australian Government Roads to Recovery Program, NSW Fixing Local Roads Program and Council cocontribution through the Additional Roads Allocation, where necessary. The re-sheeting program either completed segments that were not gravelled, or sheeted the road in its entirety. These roads will not need any additional material for approximately ten years.





JACKS CREEK BRIDGE

Jacks Creek Bridge on the Biddon-Bearbong Road was extensively damaged from the natural disasters. The old timber bridge was replaced with a new single span 12.1m by 4.8m InQuik concrete bridge.

RESEALS

Reseals completed during this term of Council included:

- 6km National Park Road
- 4km Yarrandale Road
- 6km John Renshaw Drive

Both National Park and Yarrandale Roads were carried out with Roads to Recovery funding, while John Renshaw Drive was completed under the NSW Block Grant.



ROAD RECONSTRUCTION AND WIDENING

BERIDA BULLAGREEN

During this term of Council, the overall rehabilitation and widening of Berida Bullagreen Road was finished. This work commenced in the previous term with the final 6.13km completed in March 2023. The work was co-funded between the NSW Fixing Local Roads Program, and Australian Government Roads to Recovery and Council.

LEECHES CREEK

The first 2km of Leeches Creek Road (from the Newell Highway) were shoulder widened. This project was fully funded by the Australian Government under the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

BERIDA INNISFAIL/LEECHES CREEK FLOODWAYS

Following a meeting with landholders, the creek at the intersection of Berida Innisfail and Leeches Creek Roads was cleaned out and two concrete causeways were newly constructed. The causeway on Leeches Creek Road was 72m, while on Berida Innisfail Road measured 27m. These works were funded by the Commonwealth's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

FUNDING FOR NATIONAL PARK ROAD UPGRADES

Council secured funding for sealing of the unsealed sections of National Park Road and construction of an all weather floodway at Baronne Creek. 12.5kms of unsealed road will be sealed, including new pavement, at a total cost of \$4,878,374. This comprised \$3M from the NSW Fixing Local Roads Program, \$878,444 from the Commonwealth's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and the balance from Council.

Council also secured funding to address the problematic floodway at Baronne Creek. A new 200m concrete structure will be installed at this crossing at a total cost of \$2M. The funding was \$900,000 from the Federal and State co-funded Infrastructure Betterment Fund, \$1,000,000 from the NSW Local Government Recovery Grant and \$100,000 from Council.



REGIONAL AND LOCAL ROAD REPAIR PROGRAM

Council achieved 73,000m² of heavy patching across the sealed regional and local road network under this NSW State Government program. This work required a dedicated crew working solely on this program for around 18 months at a total cost of \$2.22M.



BORE 6

Bore 6 installation was finished in August 2023, complete with all headworks and controller units. The total expenditure for all three bores and associated pipework was \$1,497,945 with \$1,110,000 funded from Restart NSW and \$387,945 co-contributed from Council. This equates to three new bores at a total cost to Council of around \$130,000 each while achieving the overall objective of improved water security for Gilgandra.



BIDDON CREEK EROSION

The long-standing erosion problem at Biddon Creek was addressed by this Council. Despite the issue being on Crown Land, it had been referred to multiple agencies over time, but no funding seemed to be available to address the matter and no State Government Agency accepted responsibility. Council undertook the remediation using funds from the Commonwealth's Local Roads and Infrastructure Program.

ROAD MAINTENANCE COUNCIL CONTRACT

Council has a dedicated crew and equipment that performs contract work for Transport for NSW on the highways. Each year the standard works include heavy patching, reseals and routine maintenance. In 2023/24 Council undertook major construction work in Warren Shire on the Oxley Highway. This project was known as the Dick's Camp project (due to its proximity to the road of the same name) and involved a mix of heavy patching, shoulder widening, culvert replacements and reconstruction of two major causeways using 'deep lift' stabilising techniques. The work was 4.5km long, took three months to complete and involved six staff at a total cost of \$2.73M.



WATER AND SEWER

The replacement of water mains was focused on those in Tooraweenah Village. During this term, Council replaced 1,685m of water mains in Murray, Bridge and Newton Streets.

Council also relined 3,687m of sewer mains in Gilgandra. This work was concentrated on mains that lead into Sewer Pump Station 2 located behind the Gilgandra Services Club. This area was identified as an area where a substantial amount of stormwater ingress occurs and includes a large portion of the older sections of town, such as the CBD.

Council also progressed the replacement of the Sewer Treatment Plant. Council received funding under the NSW Safe and Secure Water Program following a successful business case to replace the town's treatment plant, a sewer pump station and upgrade another. To date, the detailed designs have now reached near completion in readiness for construction. The next stage will be construction, once funding and approval is gained.



LUCAS BRIDGE OPENING

On 27 April 2022 Federal Member for Parkes Hon. Mark Coulton MP joined Mayor Doug Batten for the official opening of Lucas Bridge.

The name 'Lucas Bridge' acknowledges the work of Mr Lance Lucas, who monitored the flood levels at this site from the mid-1950's until 1978. It was great to have members of Mr Lucas' family in attendance - Graham and Bev Lewis, Ken and Jill Lucas, Wayne and Janelle Lewis to celebrate.

UPGRADES AND HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS COUNCIL TERM INCLUDE:

- Special Care Wing upgrades at Cooee Lodge Hostel; the project included new flooring, painting and curtains.
- Jack Towney Hostel room upgrades and renovations;
 15 rooms being renovated with paint, new kitchens,
 and bathrooms, along with new fittings and finishes.
- Five Cooee Lodge Villa upgrades.
- Over 10,500 meals delivered through Meals on Wheels, with the help of over 40 volunteers.
- Over 3,500 community service trips, with the help of over 40 volunteers.
- 19 supported employment positions at Carlginda Enterprises, and undertaking of recycling program for Gilgandra and Bogan Shire Councils.
- Purchase of new industrial shredding machine in 2022, resulting in a commercial shredding operation and opportunity for a diversified work solution for Carlginda enterprises workforce.
- Opening of the Buunji Activities Centre at Jack Towney Hostel.









GROWORX PROGRAM

Council, in collaboration with the international immigration organisation Groworx, addressed workforce shortages by welcoming 16 Filipino workers to Gilgandra in October 2023. The new workforce, included overseas-trained Registered Nurses and care workers who have completed an Australian Certificate III in Aged Care, to join Gilgandra Lifestyles, with six nurses obtaining Australian Registered Nurse qualifications.

All 16 Filipino workers were housed in the community by the generous support of locals, with a large community welcoming event well attended. This initiative aims to meet staffing requirements and enhance care services in the region.





GILGANDRA LIFESTYLES BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT FUND

Expenditure through the Business Improvement Fund resulted in improvements of governance, occupancy, systems and processes across the Gilgandra Lifestyle service. The Business Improvement Fund also contributed to the capital improvements in the Special Care Wing at Cooee Lodge Hostel.

FEDERAL COMPLIANCE & NEW AGED CARE REFORMS

In 2023 the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission assessed and found compliant both Cooee Lodge and Jack Towney Hostels along with the Commonwealth Home Support programs and the Home Care program. Three year (maximum) accreditation was achieved.

Additionally, in 2023 the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety extensively highlighted the importance of staffing levels and ensuring high-quality residential care. As a result, Cooee Lodge employed five Registered Nurses across a range of experiences and skills, ensuring all residents receive comprehensive care and support 24 hours a day, 7 days per week. These standards and reforms have guided practices within Gilgandra Lifestyles and are embedded within the day-to-day operations of the service.





MANAGING A COVID-19 ENVIRONMENT

In February 2023, two years after the first confirmed case of COVID-19 in Australia, Cooee Lodge announced its first confirmed cases of the virus. Cooee Lodge remained committed to comprehensive safety protocols, including strict visitor restrictions, enhanced hygiene practices, and health monitoring for residents and staff. The lodge ensured compliance with government guidelines, provided vaccinations, and maintained transparent communication with families and the public. Cooee Lodge's diligent approach effectively safeguarded residents' health and wellbeing, demonstrating a strong commitment to safety and care during the pandemic, and today.




ORANA LIVING

Some of the highlights over this Council term include:

- Orana Living underwent an Executive Service
 Review. The review was done in consultation with
 Lakes Advisory and the findings have resulted in an
 action plan being developed to improve the service
 and ensure financial sustainability for the future.
- During the 2023/24 budget cycle Orana Living accepted delivery of a new bus. The bus was well received by staff and clients and has the capacity for eight passengers and two wheel-chaired passengers. The bus has been on order for three years due to COVID.
- Strategic Directions were engaged to business map the processes of Orana Living to be able to develop a gap analysis of current processes and systems. An action plan was developed to implement new technology to better manage processes within Orana Living.
- Orana Living was featured in the Regional Lifestyle Magazine. The feature highlighted the inclusive nature of Orana Living and the Gilgandra community and the diversity in service offerings for the clients of Orana Living.



- Director Aged Care and Disabilities, Orana Living Manager and a specialised consultant completed a review of the current Life Skills Centre and the programs which are offered. This review resulted in improvements in programming, more person-centred choices for the clients and improved compliance to NDIS indicators and clients personal choices.
- The Orana Living Advisory Board was established to enhance governance of the Orana Living and Disability Services.
- A review of current policies and procedures was conducted and resulted in the service refining policies to better reflect the current NDIS quality principles and the needs of the client cohort.
- Continued work with NDIS quality personnel to maintain compliance for registration.
- During the management of COVID outbreaks, infection control principles and policies were strengthened. This enhanced staff practices and resulted in low impacts of COVID on the Orana Living clients.





GILGANDRA WASTE FACILITY & CARLGINDA ENTERPRISES

Upgrades to the Waste Facility will support Carlginda Enterprises in providing recycling services to the local community and improving quality of the recycled product for market. One recycling shed and seperate awning was constructed to store recycled product bales away from the weather, while enough material is accumulated for market. A new baler and shredder were purchased to improve processing operations.

UPGRADES TO GILGANDRA POUND

The animal shelter is an important facility to assist Council achieve its companion animal responsibilities. Installation of solar power along with powerpoints, internal and external sensor lighting fixtures, hot water system and internal fans improved site security, hygiene and infection control, and comfort for impounded animals particularly in warmer months.

SHADE SAILS AT HUNTER PARK

Installation of new shade sails at Hunter Park provided adequate shade and UV protection during summer months while ensuring sufficient solar gain during winter, increasing the usability across all seasons. Shade sails were successfully installed over the play equipment area, Peter Veness Skate Park, and within the swimming pool grounds. This initiative enhances the comfort and safety of these outdoor spaces, providing greater accessibility and enjoyment throughout the year.

FITNESS CENTRE AND YOUTH CLUB - AMENITIES REFRESH

The amenities refresh for the Gilgandra Fitness Centre and Youth Club included upgrading the toilets, showers, and accessible bathroom, significantly enhancing the services at each of these facilities. This project aimed to improve the amenities for all users, with a particular focus on female patrons, and to enhance accessibility and inclusion. The upgraded amenities elevated the facility's standard, ensuring greater satisfaction and comfort for the community members who utilise both the Youth Club and the Fitness Centre.

GILGANDRA YOUTH SERVICES

Gilgandra Youth Services (GYS) offers family and individualised support for youth, up to 18 years old, featuring programs including Breakfast Club, afterschool drop-in, Youth Week, and holiday activities. The Breakfast Club currently has 57 registered youth, with approximately 30 youth attending each morning to prepare breakfast before school.














In 2022, A Night Under the Gums returned for its second year on Saturday, 9 April, as a community activation event held on the banks of the Castlereagh River. Over 2,000 attendees enjoyed markets, food, beverages, lights, and live music by Hayley Jensen, Mickey Pye, Phat Brass, and more. While most attendees were from the Gilgandra Region, many came from neighboring regions and further afield, including Queensland. Despite the rain, the event was a success, generating positive outcomes for the community and local businesses.

In 2023, the event was re-branded as Under the Gums and took place on Saturday, 23 September, a little further downstream to the newly upgraded Gilgandra Cultural Precinct. Over its three years (2021-2023), the event has consistently brought the community together to enjoy live music, local and regional produce, and the riverside ambiance. The new venue increased crowd capacity and event visibility, attracting over 3,000 attendees. The 2023 event featured internationally recognised headliners Kaylee Bell and Casey Barnes, and saw over 44% of ticket holders coming from outside the region. Under the Gums has evolved from a community gathering to a regionally significant live music event.

GILGANDRA LIBRARY

Across this term of Council, the Library has continued to grow and flourish, providing high quality, current collections, information services, programs, technology and space for community connection.

Through the Library and its activities, Council supports early literacy development, with a strong focus on reading to children right from birth. Activities range from Baby Book Bags, given to new babies in Gilgandra, to the regular Storytime and Baby Rhymetime programs, and the annual "Gilgandra's Christmas Book" event, where the whole community is encouraged to read a chosen picture book to their little ones. In 2021, Gilgandra was one of 25 LGAs chosen to receive the Dolly Parton Imagination Library (DPIL) as a State Government fully funded project.

In the three years from July 2021-June 2024, there have been:



- 37,962 loans of books, audiobooks, magazines, toys and DVDs.
- 7,448 loans of e-books.
- 5,088 new items added, including 1,881 donations.

INFORMATION SERVICES

• 1,860 information, technology and local history enquiries answered.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS/ACTIVITIES

- 75 sessions of the early literacy-focused programs, Storytime and Baby Rhymetime, attended by 623 children and 318 parents or carers.

Senior's Week Cefebrations

Senior's Week is a week-long community program coordinated by Council. It sees visits to the local schools and early childhood centers, along with events at local clubs. The highlight of Senior's Week each year is the Senior's Week Luncheon, where each of the nominees for Senior Citizen of the Year are recognised, and the winner is announced. The celebration is a whole community event; Gilgandra High School hospitality students provide and serve a delicious luncheon, as part of their school assessment tasks; entertainment is provided by the local schools and Gilgandra Preschool, and by talented local residents; and community members, community organisations and local businesses donate many lucky door prizes, ensuring a large number of guests will take a gift home with them! The popularity of the event is reflected in the numbers of senior guests who have attended each year; between 105 and 110 guests each year.



CBD ACTIVATION



The new GIL Library Hub will deliver on Council's core action to drive the Gilgandra Activation Blueprint. This commitment is about delivering community assets, enhancing and complementing existing services to further drive community and visitors to the CBD, with a vibrant, attractive and socially connected space.

In 2020, Council determined the following vision, goals and outcomes for the project.

'The Library and community hub will be a dynamic community living room, creating a strong, modern centrepiece in the heart of the Gilgandra that attracts passers-by and celebrates our local identity'.

OUR GOAL

The goal of the new GIL Library Hub is to:

 Attract locals and visitors to the CBD invigorating Miller Street



- Expand the library to meet current and future demand for its services and offer additional services to more people
- Extend access to new technology and information services
- To support new and existing local businesses
- Expand access to services and facilities for locals and visitors

Construction of the building by North Construction and Building commenced on 17 February 2022. The completion of construction was delayed by a number of factors, including difficulty obtaining subcontractors and materials, unforeseen construction issues, and general economic conditions. The project will be completed in the latter half of 2024.

Opening of the Covee Heritage Centre and Galleries



In an exciting milestone for the GCP, the doors of the Coo-ee Heritage Centre (CHC) re-opened on 26 September 2022. The Visitor Information, Coo-ee March Gallery and Gilgandra Art Gallery opened initially, with the Joy Trudgett, Allan Wise and Collison Gallery opening in 2023.

The opening of the CHC also saw the first of many exhibitions in the Gilgandra Art Gallery. The inaugural 'This is Gilgandra' exhibition featured works from local artists, showcasing what the region has to offer.

Extensive community consultation sessions and feedback from Gilgandra Region residents, the Aboriginal Stakeholder Group, Volunteers, Artists and Suppliers throughout the CHC renovations helped shape a project to be proud of.

The Meeting Place: Joy Trudgett Gallery

Gilgandra is known as a "meeting place" between three Aboriginal nations - Wiradjuri, Kamilaroi and Wailwan. This has been the driving idea behind this project. This has been developed in consultation with the Gilgandra Aboriginal Stakeholder Group as well as Museum and Galleries NSW Advisor Program.

The Joy Trudgett Gallery is a space to showcase and share the stories, history and culture of our local Aboriginal community. This project aligns with the GCP Strategic Plan, has followed extensive community consultation with the Aboriginal Stakeholder Group since late 2018, and has received funding support from the NSW Government Regional Tourism Activation Fund and Aboriginal Partnerships Program.

An integral part of the GCP, the Meeting Place is an Aboriginal experience providing a place of connection. In 2022 we saw the addition of a 'yarn circle' with the three Aboriginal nations of this region represented.

In collaboration with Arterial Design, community and stakeholder groups and local trades, an accessible, interactive and educational space, that fosters a sense of connection to story and place was created.




Gilgandra Cultural Precinct & Covee Heritage Centre Landscaping

Linking the Gilgandra CBD and the GCP, the two kilometre (one-way) walk showcases native fauna and flora as well as a number of windmills that once operated within Gilgandra.

These windmills are decorated with artworks designed by our local NDIS clients from Orana Living and bring colour to the walk.





Gilgandra Museum

Upgrades and works to the Gilgandra Museum include new sky lights, new signage, upgraded footpath and site fencing, and feature mural on the northern wall of the museum representing years of history, culture, and community!





Overnight Parking Trial

In May 2023 Council implemented the GCP Overnight Parking Trial. The Trial caters for up to ten fully self-contained RV's or caravans, offering overnight drive-through parking for up to 48 hours. While there are no fees to park, permits are essential via the Gilgandra Region website or the CHC. The Trial aims to boost local economic impact and enhance the Gilgandra Region to travellers as a great place to visit, explore and stay, with all camping options in the Gilgandra Region showcased in the newly developed Camping Guide.




BUSINESS NIGHT OUT SHOP LOCAL LAUNCH



Castlereagh Country Regional Drought Resilience Plan



Aligned with the Castlereagh Regional Economic Development Strategy (REDS), this community-driven plan focuses on five key areas: Farm Gate, Wellbeing, Vitality and Service, Investment and Sustainment, and Ecology and System Health. By coordinating a proactive community response to drought, addressing multiple objectives in local and state strategies, ensuring comprehensive engagement and resilience building, the project created a Priority Action Plan to guide future investment and implementation of transformational projects.



The Real Country Marketing Campaign is a collaborative effort by the Coonamble, Gilgandra, and Warrumbungle Shire Councils to promote regional tourism by showcasing the natural beauty, rich cultural heritage, and unique spirit of their communities. Highlighting the Castlereagh River, the Warrumbungle ranges, and #LocalLegends, the multifaceted campaign included the development of a website, TV commercial, feature in the Regional Lifestyle magazine, and broader social media promotion of Gilgandra and the surrounding Regions, to attract Real Country seekers from back roads to beach tracks!

BLUE TREE PROJECT

Located on the Castlereagh Highway, 1km from the Newell Highway turn off, the Blue Tree project is part of a wider social movement that creates a space to engage in mental health discussions. This project was a partnership with Community Bank Gilgandra (Bendigo Bank) with painting completed by local painters Paint'n'Plus.



AERO PARK - RESIDENTIAL SUBDIVISION



A marquee project for the region, Council launched Stage One of the Aero Park Estate, a residential housing subdivision on the northwestern boundary of Gilgandra township. This initial phase includes 22 lots ranging from 1242m² to 1897m², with prices starting at \$82,500. Aero Park Estate is a crucial component of the Gilgandra Housing Strategy and represents a significant step towards alleviating the housing shortage in the Gilgandra Region.

LOCAL HERITAGE FUND

The Gilgandra Shire Local Heritage Fund has been established to assist owners of places with heritage significance undertake conservation and restoration works. Items of heritage significance include buildings/structures/sites identified as contributing to the character of the Gilgandra Heritage Conservation Area and items included on the Gilgandra Community Based Heritage Study. The Local Heritage Fund is open for applications annually with 11 applications supported across 2022-2023, with \$21,000 in funding provided and \$45,000 in contribution from the applicants.


PLANNING PROPOSAL (INDUSTRIAL LAND)

Council has been progressing re-zoning of primary production zoned land on the western fringe of Gilgandra for Industrial purposes to ensure Gilgandra is well positioned to capitalise on future growth opportunities associated with major projects such as Inland Rail and the Renewable Energy Zone. The Planning Proposal process is currently underway with State Government agencies and is expected to be finalised in 2025, with early stage planning being undertaken for development of approximately 21 hectare Stage One industrial subdivision fronting Oxley Highway following the rezoning process.

GILGANDRA HOUSING STRATEGY

Council developed a Local Housing Strategy to guide future residential development in and around our urban area. The Strategy was developed in response to the unprecedented housing demand attributed to external interest from those wanting to experience Gilgandra first hand or invest for the future, as well as people staying in the community for longer to make Gilgandra their home.





HUNTER PARK SPORTS PRECINCT

Council has developed a final concept design for a new multipurpose sports facility and public swimming pool to be located within Hunter Park, Gilgandra.

The goal of the new multipurpose sports facility is to:

- Provide a modern youth centre and gymnasium
- Provide for multipurpose indoor sports
- Provide a new public swimming pool
- Provide a central access and egress point and shared amenities for the indoor sports facility and pool
- Expand access to services and facilities for locals
- Create a facility which builds on the success of current sporting carnivals whilst attracting new events and visitors to town

Components include:

An indoor sports centre:

- Two full size timbered multipurpose basketball courts and spectator area
- A modern gymnasium capable of being isolated and secured for after-hours access
- A youth centre including a "chill out" youth space
- A reception area
- Office and administration areas
- Shared amenities capable of servicing the pool, gymnasium and sports centre
- Kiosk/canteen area
- PA and sound systems
- Adequate car parking facilities
- CCTV
- Linkage and alternate access to the Tennis Court facilities

A new swimming pool:

- Construction of a new six lane solar heated 50m pool (with optional enclosure)
- All abilities access and egress
- Toddler swim area and splash park
- New pump house and chemical store
- Viewing area
- Storage space for Gilgandra Swimming Club
- Outdoor open space around the pool for recreational activities and supervision
- Suitable shade to meet the Gilgandra climate
- External lighting
- PA and sound systems

INLAND RAIL WATER BORE LEGACY PROJECT

The availability of water for the Inland Rail project and the community in general is a common interest point and an area that Council identified it could play an important role. With financial support from Inland Rail, Council investigated the availability of water from deep aquifers that limits competition with existing stock and domestic bores.

In March 2022, works on this project commenced with contract drillers to establish one of four test bore locations, with the first location, adjacent to Curban Community Hall.

Village Management Plans

The Village Management Plan project saw the completion of Village Management Plans for both Armatree and Tooraweenah. A collaborative internal project team worked together to develop the plans which included extensive consultation with the Armatree and Tooraweenah communities to identify the key priorities of the villages. Endorsed by Council in July 2024, the plans are community led, and focus on the future of the Armatree and Tooraweenah villages and how Council and community can work together to achieve the shared visions.







Gilgandra Region Child Care (0-12) Strategy

The Gilgandra Region Childcare Strategy aims to improve access to high quality early childhood education and care for children aged 0-12 years, now and into the future, by means of high-level planning in line with the broader Gilgandra Region CSP. Council's ambition, as outlined in the Strategy, is to partner with childcare providers, schools and others, and to advocate to government, to:

- Establish an Outside School Hours Care service in Gilgandra
- Expand the supply of Long Day Care and/or Preschool places in Gilgandra, including by actively supporting the two existing providers to expand their operations
- Promoting the region to prospective new providers through information and active support
- Encourage new providers of Family Day Care to establish for families outside of Gilgandra township
- Facilitate a functioning childcare workforce pipeline





Community Health Vision

The Gilgandra Region Community Health Vision project, including a cross-departmental collaborative project team, employed a comprehensive approach to ensure a holistic view of the community's health needs and alignment with both broader strategic drivers and local aspirations. Extensive community consultation was undertaken in the process and culminated in a Community Health Vision with strategic health and wellbeing focus areas of:

- Integrated Health Services and Equity
- Mental Health and Wellness
- · Active Living and Physical Health
- Community Connectivity and Social Inclusion
- Resilient Communities

Gilgandra Shire Council won the RH Doughtery Award 2022 for Excellence in Communications for populations less than 30,000. The award was received for the Gilgandra Region Shop Local and #Local Legend Campaign in 2021.

COMMUNITY LOCAL INFRASTRUCTURE RECOVERY PACKAGE (CLIRP)

Council is an organisation that utilises and relies upon Information and Communications Technology (ICT). At the heart of the Council's operations is the core network infrastructure, providing the critical devices and endpoints that allow the flow of information, data and phone calls across the whole of Council's decentralised locations. This network of devices is required to be operating at peak levels of efficiency to effectively leverage Information and Computing Technology for staff, visitors to the region, hostels and disability services managed by Council.

THE CORE NETWORK INFRASTRUCTURE COMPRISES THE FOLLOWING KEY AREAS:

- 1. Wireless links,
- 2. Optical fibre links and
- 3. The network switches and cabling to interconnect them.

Councils existing core network links are all wireless and have been in-place for at least ten years with significant weather and storm damage and known faulty core switches.

In addition, Council is installing an "Internet of Things" (IoT), LoRaWAN network. This comprises Gateways at Gilgandra, Curban and Tooraweenah with a weather station at each site. These Gateways enable IoT devices such as tracking devices, people counters, water level meters, water usage meters, soil moisture and automated sprinkler systems etc to be utilised. The IoT network is an emerging technology and can be further utilised and expanded for Council to provide enhanced services to the community.

PROJECT FUNDING

In 2022/2023 Council applied for and was successful in obtaining a grant of \$934,843 from the NSW Government to upgrade and repair the core network and provide a foundation to enhance the provision of community services across Council's portfolio of operations.

The implementation of this grant commenced in June 2023 and is currently 95% complete and is projected to be completed by August 2024.

The Gil Library Hub is a major communication and Hub point for Councils CBD operations and a carrier grade licensed spectrum 10GB/s wireless/fibre link from the Green Water Tower will link each CBD office into the Council network and enable the provision of Public Wi-Fi (for the Community and Visitors) through the Council network at each location.

PROJECT OUTCOMES/BENEFITS

- A core network capable of running a modern ERP (Enterprise Resource Planning System) and CRM (Customer Relationship Management System) at each of Councils sites.
- Improved and effective Business Continuity and Disaster Management and Recovery capability.
- 3. Enhanced Community services through public Wi-Fi and access at all of Councils locations and public spaces leading to a digitally connected community.
- 4. Enhance public security and monitoring.
- 5. Provision of advanced high quality IoT systems:
 - Weather Stations accessible through Councils web site at Tooraweenah, Gilgandra and Curban,
 - Tracking information on key Council and Community assets,
 - People counting at key community events,
 - · Water level locations at key locations and
 - Water Usage metering.










